

HUD uses system-level performance information as a competitive element in its annual CoC Program Competition and to gauge the state of the homeless response system nationally.



**Desired Outcome:** Reduction in the average and median length of time persons remain homeless








#### 2024 PIT Count Recap

 New this year, the BoS used the "Counting Us" mobile app for all unsheltered survey collection

Allows for real time survey data access, identifying hotspots of camps for future planning, more user-friendly format – less trying to interpret messy handwriting

- Mobile app that volunteers / staff can download to phone and conduct surveys on the spot
- Each LHC had at least one designated system administrator, able to access the <u>Command Center</u> and view results as they come in
- All data will be treated as confidential, maps and known locations will not be made public

- PIT & HIC reports are due to HUD on April 30th
- BoS will make data including the LHC level breakout available upon submission
- BoS will facilitate AT LEAST one more PIT/HIC Committee meeting before reports are due

  - Focus on reducing the system "in-flow" and coordinating the front door to services
  - Implement data metrics, performance evaluation and system monitoring

## **HSP Ad-Hoc Committee**

CoC Board approved an ad-hoc committee to develop tools, guidance and processes for LHCs to use for HSP funding application process.

- The committee will meet twice to review, edit and approve proposed tools in late December/January
- The committee will present recommendations and tools to the board for approval/adoption at the January Board meeting
- Committee membership will require at least one member from each Local Lead Agency

Examples of possible work items:

- Develop guidelines for local LHC committees in overseeing the project selection process
- Develop shared communication standards for grantees/subgrantees
- Develop sample scoring tools LHCs could use to evaluate program design and performance
- Develop written standards for HSP
